From the Principal

I am immensely proud of our school

When I review Term 2, I see what great opportunities our school has on offer for students, and that we are truly living up to our unofficial motto as "a school of opportunity". From surfing competitions in Week 1 of this term, trips to Freshwater Bay by the Earth and Environmental Science students, through to school productions, music events, lighting carnivals, Young Writers Programs, Maths competitions, and Curtin University excursions, you name it, our students have had opportunities to engage in the most incredible list of activities. We truly are a school of opportunity.

When I meet with prospective parents, I always go to lengths to explain the sheer number of extra-curricular opportunities our students can engage with from sporting clubs, to Chess Club, our environmental group, languages conversation clubs, Makerspace and paper recycling through to the lunch time arts and sports programs. Whatever your child's interest is, there a likelihood we will have an opportunity for them to engage in an area of interest and passion. Prospective parents are always impressed, and we often hear from them, "This is just like a private school then?" And the answer is yes, we offer many opportunities, very similar to that of private schools.

We offer opportunities outside of the traditional classroom to not only further a student's content knowledge, but to also improve students social and emotional wellbeing. Several years ago, as a school, we decided to imbed the principles of Act Belong Commit, and through our clubs, extracurricular programs, camps and excursions we are able to offer students the opportunity to connect with others. To make new friendships, develop soft skills, feel success outside of the classroom, form deeper connections with the school and improve their self confidence.

One of our school's most important programs outside of the classroom is our long running and highly valued Community Service Program. No other Government high school has a program a well resourced and as well run as ours. Each year at the Presentation Ceremony we hear of students with 200, 300 or even 400 of community service hours. The numbers of students each year achieving the Duke of Edinburgh grows.

I strongly encourage students in their later high school years to become involved in our Community Service Program. Involvement in programs such this can:

A busy term for our Senior Secondary

A busy term for our Senior Secondary students The Semester 1 exams were run in Term 2. There were close to 600 students completing exams in over 50 different courses. I commend the students; it all ran smoothly, and most students arrived early, well prepared and followed the sickness misadventure process when required. For our Year 11 ATAR students, the Semester 1 exams are the first round of exams they attempt in Senior School. For some students, this will be the first three-hour exam they have completed. While some see exams as stressful, the opportunity to sit an exam, practice the process of answering examstyle questions under timed conditions and then obtain feedback is invaluable. To support students health and wellbeing leading up to exams our Senior School Psychologist Mel Hutflesz ran sessions on stress management and self-care. Students were supported leading up to exams and during the exam period by our excellent Student Services. During this time, our students who are enrolled in Workplace Learning carried out their first placement in Industry. Reading the fantastic feedback the students received from the various placements was pleasing. I hope all students benefited from their placement and learned new things about their industry.

Course selections for 2025

Year 11

After completing a semester of Senior Secondary and the first round of exams for ATAR students, now is a time for reflection. Students must consider their current performance and carefully choose courses for next year. Achievement of the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) must be the priority for all students; course selections must ensure that students are on the right path to success. I was delighted to see the number of parents attending the Year 11 Parent Information Evening, obtaining valuable information about future successful pathways and engaging with key staff about specific courses for their young people. This information is available on the school website. Students will be given a similar presentation to ensure all stakeholders know their expectations, pathways and future success. Subject Selection Online (SSO) will manage the course selection process. More information will be given to students and emailed to parents before the end of the term. The Year 12 Course Selection Handbook is available on our website under 'Learning' and 'Senior Secondary'. It's important to note that students should aim to achieve eight 'C' grades or equivalents in year 11 to be on track to achieving WACE in Year 12.

Year 10

Our Career Development Practitioner has been working with the Year 10 students on their transition program in preparation for choosing courses for Year 11 in 2025. Every student has received a planning tool to help determine the suitable courses to achieve success and move towards their intended career. The Year 11 Course Selection Handbook, available on the school website under 'Learning' and 'Senior Secondary', provides a wealth of information. I encourage all parents and students to read its contents. As with Year 11, SSO will be used, and more information about this process will be emailed by the end of the term. The Year 10 Parent Evening and Learning Area Expo was well attended, and it was pleasing to see staff and parents engaging in informative and insightful conversations.

Please note that courses in both Year 11 and Year 12 are 'year-long'; therefore, the grade awarded at the end of the year is the grade received for both Semester 1 and Semester 2.

Year 11 Predicted ATAR and High Achievers

After finalising marks from exams and Semester 1 reports, the data will be analysed and ATAR predictions calculated. Students will be provided with their first round of predicted ATAR in Senior School and an information session outlining the processes used to obtain their ATAR. Students with a predicted ATAR of 95 or higher will be invited to join the 2024/2025 Breakfast Club. The inaugural Breakfast Club for our Year 11 high achievers will be held in Term 3.

Year 12 Breakfast Club

Our Year 12 Breakfast Club was held on Tuesday, 12 March, in the Mentelle room at the Rendezvous Scarborough, with the beach and the beautiful Indian Ocean as our backdrop. We had 55 students achieve a predicted ATAR of 95 or above based on their final results in Year 11. It's a wonderful opportunity to acknowledge these students who are 'aiming high' and allow them to listen to a Churchlands Alumni's journey and tips for success. The guest speaker on this occasion was Professor Dr Kelly Valentin from the Curtin University Medical School.

NAPLAN results from testing early this year have just been forwarded to the school

It has been fantastic being the Middle School Associate Principal this Term. I have noticed excellent academic, sporting, and artistic achievements by students in Years 9 and 10, both at and outside school.

Term 2, which lasted eleven weeks, was very busy with many activities, events, and exams for our Year 10 students.

OLNA and NAPLAN

In week 2, about 40 students participated in the Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment (OLNA). These students missed doing OLNA at the end of last year. The results for these students were outstanding as most students achieved the standards set by SCSA for Year 9 students. The NAPLAN results from testing early this year have just been forwarded to the school, and we shall publish these in SEQTA early next Term. Preliminary results indicate that our Year 9 students have done very well. This is thanks to your hard work and those of your teachers.

Subject Selection Online (SSO)

Subject Selection Online would have been open from June 26 for Year 9 and Year 10 students. Parents must utilize this to choose elective courses for Year 9 and Year 10 students next year. Parents should have received an email with instructions on how to complete this. Please refer to the handbook on our website for specific information about each course offered. Note that this process is open until July 19, and if they need any assistance, parents can always contact me or the Head of Years.

Year 10 Examinations

In weeks 8 and 9, the Year 10 students sat at least four exams. It was the first time students in middle secondary school undertook exams that were longer than one hour for teachers to assess their learning and simultaneously prepare them for upper school.

Middle secondary students participated in many special events, including the School Musical, Year 9 and 10 Carnivals, the HSC Netball Competition, the ANZAC Day Commemoration Ceremony, and the Dance Drama Night. I want to thank all involved for their dedication to making these events successful.

I would also like to congratulate Year 9 students with significant achievements outside school.

Y – safe PRESENTATION

On Tuesday, June 4th, the Year 7s participated in a presentation about online safety. Y-Safe provides cyber safety education and support to students Australia-wide. The students learnt about key issues when engaging online, such as legal requirements and responsibilities, online behaviours against the law, and strategies to deal with negative online behaviour. In a fun and interactive presentation, students were given an acronym #probs to create an awareness of what they are posting online. The acronym #probs stands for: P : Perceive – how will this post be perceived by others? R : Reach – who will potentially see this post? O : Outcome – what are the potential unforeseen outcomes of this post?

BS : Better Strategy – what better way could I have approached this post to if I have hurt someone in the process?

Basketball Competition

To increase friendships and connections and have some fun together as a cohort, our Year 7 Leadership group surveyed all Year 7 students early in Term 2, asking what types of activities students would like to engage in during breaks with their friends. Many suggestions were made, but basketball was the clear winner from the survey. This competition was run during recess on Wednesdays in the gym.

Our Year 8 student leaders launched several activities this term

It was a warm start to Term 2, with our Year 8's making the most of the sunshine. Term 2 can be one of increased stress as we near some end of topic tests and semester 1 reports, but it also offers some tremendous extracurricular activities to engage in.

The AEP students flew north to Coral Bay for their camp, exploring the Ningaloo Reef and seeing firsthand the impacts of climate change and human impact on the ecosystem. Each day looked a bit different, with the mornings spent engaging in activities such as kayaking, underwater scootering, snorkelling or heading out on the boat to swim with manta rays. The afternoons were for lessons that encouraged critical and creative thinking.... With a moment to celebrate Josh's birthday too. Back at school, the launch of the RAISE and imPact mentoring programs have provided selected students with a new medium to engage with school and work towards fostering personal relationships. All this in the first two weeks!

Rolling into Week 3, students head off to their chosen sports to compete in the lightning carnival which is always a good, fun day. Across to music and we saw some excellent musicianship in the Junior and Intermediate concerts.

Our Year 8 student leaders launched several activities this term. The first is the Year 7/8 dodgeball competition. 16 teams dodge, duck, dip, dive and dodging their way to the top. The atmosphere in the gym during Thursday recess was fantastic for competitors and spectators.

The second initiative is 'Wonderous Wednesdays'. Each Wednesday, Recess, two of our student leaders set out armed with a clipboard, pen, and a question, and the result was published in the notices the next day. The purpose of Wonderous Wednesdays is simple: to create friendly, controversial discussions at a school-wide level and help foster a sense of school community. Each week, the leaders observe students across year groups engaging in friendly debate long after the leaders have walked off to survey a new group of students.

So far, we have asked (and discovered) the following: Do they play "soccer" or "football" at the World Cup? (68% of respondents call it "soccer")

Does pineapple belong on Pizza? (55% of respondents said yes to pineapple)

Do you prefer to watch basketball, soccer, AFL, or cricket? (A close one: 33% said soccer, 30% basketball, 29% AFL, 8% cricket.)

Finally, our Year 8's this term are faced with difficult decisions for some and an easy decision for others: Year 9 subject selections. There is such an incredible, vast array of electives on offer for students. I encourage students to talk to their friends, family, teachers and house coordinator if they want to learn more about a subject. Choose something you want to do because you think it will be fun, practical and/or interesting, not because someone told you to do it.

Semester 1 is over; we look forward to the second half of the year!










HASS ANZAC Service



The Year 8 AEP students went to Coral Bay for an immersive learning experience about the natural environment of the Ningaloo Reef and the surrounding coastal area. We travelled to Perth Airport to meet Mr Carr, Mr Sauer, Ms Ford, Ms Gardiner, Mrs Harvey, and Mr Cox and then caught a plane to Learmouth Military Base.

Following a two-hour bus ride, we arrived in Coral Bay and were so thankful it was not the 16-hour bus drive from Perth that we had heard about in previous years. We then went on to meet the camp owner, Kane, and his staff, who set up our tents and living arrangements. After a very long-awaited lunch, we walked down the beach to have our first swim at Bills Bay.

Our week was filled with unique experiences, each one more exciting than the last. We had the thrill of kayaking, the fun of sea scootering, the wonder of glass bottom boat trips, and the awe of a manta ray tour. The sea scooters, in particular, were a hit. They allowed us to swim out and see the coral formations up close. We even had the chance to explore an ancient coral formation, Ayers Rock, which was teeming with marine life like butterfly fish and damsel fish.

The glass-bottom boat tour involved lots of snorkelling in the Ningaloo Reef, where we witnessed amazing coral formations in many different colours and an array of marine life. The manta ray tour was by far the most immersive, where we experienced the joys of swimming with manta rays and turtles and seeing dolphins and tiger sharks. We want to come back to go on the tiger shark tour in our own time and be able to swim with them, too!

One evening during camp, we met a marine biologist, Fraiser, who told us about his life as a marine biologist specialising in the Ningaloo Reef. We were fortunate to have an expert come and teach us so much about the local marine life and how they are all so crucial to the health of the ocean's ecosystem. Another night, we watched a documentary, Blue, about the actual harm human pressures are placing on our oceans. The week would not be complete without showing the movie Finding Nemo; we all relaxed that night.

On our final evening of camp, we had the opportunity to form little teams of eight for Mr. Sauer's quiz night. The topics ranged from biological sciences to camp experiences. There were novelty activities in between quiz rounds, where a teammate was nominated for a challenge, such as the best party trick and musical chairs. 

Fostering a Growth Mindset

Fostering a Growth Mindset: Partnering with Parents for Student Success

At Churchlands we are committed to fostering both academic excellence and the overall development of our students. One focus is the cultivation of a growth mindset, this is an essential component of lifelong learning and personal growth. A growth mindset is particularly important in the context of formative assessment, as it helps students view challenges as opportunities for improvement and believe that their abilities can be developed through dedication and hard work.

Understanding Growth Mindset

The concept of a growth mindset, introduced by psychologist Carol Dweck, contrasts with a fixed mindset. In a fixed mindset, individuals believe their talents and intelligence are static traits that cannot change. Conversely, a growth mindset is the belief that abilities can be developed through effort, perseverance, and learning from mistakes. By fostering a growth mindset, we empower our students to become resilient, confident, and motivated learners. A growth mindset enhances the effectiveness of formative assessment by encouraging students to view feedback as an opportunity for growth rather than as criticism.



The Benefits of a Growth Mindset in Formative Assessment

Encourages Resilience

Formative assessment often involves feedback on areas for improvement. Students with a growth mindset are more likely to embrace this feedback and persist through challenges, seeing them as steps toward mastery.

Builds Confidence

By recognising that their efforts lead to progress, students build self-confidence. Formative assessment becomes a tool for self-improvement rather than a judgment of ability, helping students believe in their potential to succeed.

Enhances Learning

A growth mindset fosters a love for learning and curiosity. When students understand that effort leads to improvement, they become more engaged in formative assessment activities, leading to deeper understanding and academic achievement.

Help your child view mistakes as learning opportunities. Discuss what they can learn from the experience and how to move forward, mirroring the reflective nature of formative assessment.

Promote Problem-Solving

Encourage your child to tackle challenges and think of solutions independently. Support them in developing problem-solving skills rather than providing immediate answers, fostering the independence needed for effective formative assessment.
